PB4L - Positive Behaviour For Learning

PB4L is a school wide look at behavior and learning from a whole-of-school as well as an individual child perspective. The framework is based on international evidence. PB4L School-Wide takes at least 3-5 years to put in place. Over this time, schools should see:

- Incidents of problem behaviour decline
 - The behaviour of students improve
 - Teachers spending more time teaching
 - Students more engaged and achieving
- PB4L School-Wide takes the approach that opportunities for learning and achievement increase if:
- The school environment is positive and supportive
 - Expectations are consistently clear
 - Students are consistently taught desired behaviours
 - Students are consistently acknowledged for desired behaviours and undesirable behaviours are responded to in a fair and equitable way.

We are currently investigating our school taking on this professional development.

Our school has a very responsive behaviour management programme based on restorative practice, our virtues programme and concept of Living above the line. However maintaining this safe and positive environment requires us to regularly be reviewing, adjusting and adapting innovative practices. Our school is finding that students needs are changing and that managing challenging behaviour is growing. Parents are also reporting increased tensions with student behaviour and wellbeing.

We are happy that this commitment to PB4L over the next few years, will assist students, staff and whanau.

Staff meet with the PB4L facilitator later this month and further information will follow.

On the 18th of October, Matt Smith, Jack Bowen, Liam Meijer and Talyor McLachlan went to Christchurch to represent St Johns Hill School in the National Team Event and then competed as individuals. First was the team event which was run by Chess Power. Our school placed 16th out of 42 teams. Taylor got 5 points in the team event. Matt also got 5 points in the team event and Liam also got 5 points and Jack got 3 and 1/2 points finishing with 18 and 1/2 points. The next day, the individual tournament also run by Chess Power. Room 6 Art Gallery Visit

Room 6 visited the Whanganui Art Gallery last Friday. We viewed the 'Retrospect' Exhibition by Wi Taepa, which looks at over thirty years of clay work by the Māori ceramist. Wi combines his background in whakairo (carving) and sculpture, creating beautiful vessels that tell stories about his life and the environment around him. Clay building techniques of coiling, pinching and slab are used to create Wi's artworks.



Upon returning to the art classroom, Sietske Jansma (art educator) modelled making a pinch pot using some of the techniques and features viewed in Wi's work.

A slab of clay was handed to students (and parents!) to make their own innovative pinch pot creations, using inspiration from Wi and Sietske. The finished artworks are being fired, to be returned to their artists in a few week's time.

Voluntary Donation

Thank you to all who have been able to make this payment to our school. High decile schools are once again being "hit in the pocket" financially. The Government is now allowing decile 1 → 7 schools to opt into a scheme where instead of asking parent/whanau for a donation, they can apply to the MOE for \$150 per pupil. Schools decile are done on a region by region basis. For Whanganui, St Johns Hill School is a Decile 9, the highest in Whanganui. However if we were put on a national decile system against many areas for example, Khandallah in Wellington/Remuera in Auckland/Hokowhitu in Palmerston North, I believe we would be much lower and we would receive considerably greater resourcing. Therefore, now not only do we receive significantly less money to operate the school, provide any special needs programme and support, employ teacher aides, purchase resources etc but now we are also disadvantaged in being unable to opt in for MOE School Donation Scheme.

If we were in the scheme, we would be able to apply for \$63,000. Currently from our school donation request we have received to date \$16,800. You can see the significant financial disadvantage. Protest is being made regarding the decision, however no change is going to be made.

The response is that families from high decile schools have the better means to support their school financially. I know, for some, this is not the case. We do appreciate your efforts to support our school through the donation, and your support of our hardworking PTA, who also put in much effort to fund-raise for "extras" the school needs. On that note, a huge thank you to our PTA who have just contributed \$21,000 from their recent fundraising efforts for heat pumps. We now have them installed in all our classrooms, ready for the hot summer months. Yes!!!
